This month's Speaker Bio

Bill gives talks nationally and internationally on a wide range of topics ranging from his specialty, "Bulbophyllums", to General Orchid Culture which is a favorite of most new growers. They all are presented in a funny style that helps growers understand how the plants work and they all revolve around the Culture of Orchids. He helps the beginner grower with lots of advice about fixing problems and has a wealth of accumulated information for the more advanced grower, too!

This meeting, the talk will be on Bill's trip to the Philippines in 2009 where he climbed mountains (sort of) and risked life and limb (maybe) to bring back a new species of orchid which will be shown at the meeting (true story). It is a wonderful and interesting journey into the deep jungles to see new orchids in their natural habitat.

Many people say he is one of the best speakers they have ever heard. See for yourself.

He has published a new book, Bulbophyllums; the Incomplete Guide, From A to WHY? (\$65) And has a 5-year-long EBook of almost every aspect of orchid growing and showing. Tons of videos of orchids growing under all sorts of conditions, repotting, fixing problems and lots of other stuff. It also has a 1500-photo folder with the most detailed photos you have ever seen. (\$69.95).

February Meeting Minutes

Christian was our presenter at the February meeting. He did an excellent series of videos with Sue Kennedy at her greenhouse in Litchfield. There he showed proper methods of potting orchids.

He explained the difference between monopodial and sympodial orchids, In other words, upright-growing phalaenopsis versus cattleya orchids, which form a series of pseudobulbs. First a Phal was cleaned and repotted, and then a complicated overgrown Catt was extracted from its basket, cleaned and divided. He dips successive plants in a bucket of disinfectant called Zeritol. It is a quaternary disinfectant. Some dust with cinnamon .Dark, hollow, or mushy roots should be removed. Green, firm roots are fine. Different media were discussed, such as moss, bark, and orchid mounts. Bark is soaked before use. Interestingly, he said not to use drainage pebbles that will affect the plant, such as marble chips. River rock is OK. You can test moisture with a bamboo skewer, or pencil, by pushing it to the bottom of the pot and waiting five minutes. If it is moist, the plant doesn't need water.

Dave has planted orchids in a colander!
