President's Message

Hi everyone,

It only came onto my radar once there were severe symptoms of plant decline manifesting throughout the collection I was working with, truly a situation that would strike fear in the heart of any orchid professional. When we think of disease-causing organisms in plants and animals we often overlook the commonalities between the maladies we experience and those that affect plants. While we can't necessarily come down with a fungal case of botrytis or a viral case of CymMV there are similarities in how these diseases are spread. It's important to be aware of common pathogens so that disease prevention in your plants becomes as second nature as washing your hands before eating.
