President's Message

Hi Everyone,

There is never enough time! In a world crafted to our hearts desire we would always have enough time to spend with the people we care about and on the things we love. As it's the days are still growing shorter and daylight feels like a precious commodity, I find myself planning ahead and prioritizing anything that I want to accomplish outside, while putting the garden to winter rest is taking weeks rather than a few summer days. At the same time everything green and growing is taking a break so should we! As 2024 draws to a close, it's time to take a moment for self-reflection and see what went well this year and perhaps what didn't go so well. Perhaps pest populations got a bit out of control in the collection, or a few things ended up getting a bit overwatered in their summer location. Maybe you discovered that growing a new orchid genera was easier than you thought or you finally splurged on a grow tent and lights with surprising improvements for your plants. Take a moment to look back at where you've been and prepare to set your sights on where you want to be next year.

The meeting this past month with Dave Sorokowsky from Paph Paradise was well attended and I hope everyone gleaned some important cultural information from his talk 'Don't fear the Slippers.' His talk was structured around roughly five main groups of Paphs., Maudiae, Complex, Multifloral, Parvi, and Brachy in which most species can be grouped with similar cultural requirements. A common theme we are always hearing was repeated again, 'More water, More often!'. Pot your plants up in a well-draining mix which dries down quickly, the key to keeping the roots healthy is frequently flushing them with clear water. Mixes that take a long time to dry down build up salts more easily since you can't leach as often. The key takeaways for each group were.

Maudiae- don't like to dry out completely, benefit from regular repotting, yearly.

Complex- hardier, can take it cooler, keep them drier, but give them enough water when they are in bloom.

Multiflorals- like it warm and bright with your cattleyas, bigger bark mix for bigger pots, only repot in the summer, don't repot when cool.

Parvis- need superior drainage, grow on rocks in habitat, bright light, but less intense than multiflorals, most appreciate oyster shells, need calcium.

Brachys- keep them shady, like it warm, keep them on heat mats if your growing area doesn't stay warm enough

This month it's time to kick back and relax, no need to take notes. it's time to socialize. Our meeting will be the annual Holiday Party at the Farmington Senior Center on December 11th at 6:30pm. Similar to last year the club will be buying in entrees from a local restaurant and we ask that everyone bring either a side, salad, or desert. - 3. There are orchid shows coming up beginning in January where COS will need blooming plants to display. Cape and Islands Orchid Society will have their show Saturday and Sunday January 25-26 at the Hyport Conference Center in Barnstable MA. Mary will set up the COS table.
- 4. 2025 Membership dues will be collected soon. Dues is \$30 for an individual or \$35 for a family. Lifetime membership is also available for \$300 for an individual or \$350 for a family. - 5. 2025 meetings are still in the planning phases. Speakers/programs are being determined.
- 7. Our guest speaker for the November 13th meeting was Dave Sorokowsky from Paph Paradise Orchids, in CA. He has over 20 years of experience growing and breeding top quality orchids with over 100 AOS and CSA awards. The topic of his presentation was "Don't Fear the Slippers (paphiopedilums or paph for short)". Contrary to the opinion of many orchid growers, Dave believes that growing paphs is not difficult to do. He began his talk by emphasizing that it is important to water paphs thoroughly in order to flush salts out of the medium and to provide oxygen to the roots. He discussed the need to fertilize your plants after watering. Don't fertilize while the potting medium is dry. Dave gave a detailed account of growing Maudiae or mottled leaf paphs, Complex Paphs and Multiflorals. 
